

Important stuff you need to know...

A Couple Pages of Club History

(for those who don't know...)

ounded in 1893 under the inspiration of A. Baldwin Sloan. The group was organized to "put on shows for the benefit of charities and between engagements to cultivate social relations among its members and to conduct periodic social events and fraternal entertainment."

Paint and Powder is the oldest club of its kind in the US.

Club membership was restricted to males only and the cast members of the shows consisted exclusively of men with the female parts played by men similar to the days of Shakespeare.

The first show was held on February 5 & 6, 1894 at the Ford's Theater on Fayette Street in Baltimore City. The name of show was Mustapha, a musical comedy written by Baldwin Sloan who later became a leading composer of Broadway musicals. The show raised \$5,800, which was turned over to the Children's Country Home.

At one time in the very early years of the club the show was taken on the road to eight different cities including Washington DC, Richmond, Harrisburg, Fairmount West VA and Philadelphia. The Club performed "The Bell of New York" at the New National Theater, Washington DC on April 1, 1910.

On December 6, 1907 there was a coal mine explosion at the #6 and #8 mine shafts of the Fairmount Coal Company's complex in Monongah, West Virginia. It is to this day the most tragic coal mine explosion in the history of The United States. A total of 362 lives were lost in the blast leaving 250 widows and 1000 children. A relief effort was organized by the good citizens of Fairmount West Virginia. On January 6, 1908, The Paint and Powder Club of Baltimore City gave a benefit concert at the Fairmount Grand Opera House. The show performed by the Club was "The Don of Doryea, the clubs annual show for 1907. The proceeds from the show, \$1,001.00 was given to The Monongan Mines Relief Fund.

Women were not allowed in the shows until 1938. Prior to 1938 women worked behind the scenes handling costumes, decorations etc. There was an attempt to go back to an all-male cast in 1950 and 1951 with a show called "Good? OL Days Review" and "It's a Woman's World", however by 1952 women were brought back as members of the cast.

Membership was opened to women in 1994. There were nine courageous women at that time who put their life and reputation on the line to become the charter female members of the club. They were Chris Barry Hergenroeder, Bernie Cook, Jody Duke, Patricia Lowman, Geraldine Messina, Sammy Schultz, Kandi Slade, Sandy Stellmann and Natalie Sullivan. Kandi Slade became the first female president of the Club in 1998 and she went on to serve three consecutive terms, the most any president has ever served. Today women make up more than half of the membership and had it not been for their involvement in the Club it may not be in existence today.

Famous members of the club:

A Baldwin Sloan---Wrote the first show, "Mustapha" and went on to Broadway to write many musicales. He wrote an early version of the musical Wizard of Oz which opened on Broadway in 1903.

Harry Lehr---Who was married to Elizabeth Drexel Dahlgren, was a well know social climber in the world of New York and Newport society at the turn of the century.

Dr. Thomas H. Buckler---Personal physician to General Robert E. Lee.

Charles Joseph Bonaparte----Grandnephew of Napoleon Bonaparte, Secretary of the Navy and U. S. Attorney General under President Theodore Roosevelt.

Bill Mullikin---Played Bill Hackle in the Broadway Hit "Hello Dolly". His Broadway debut was with Ertha Kitt, Paul Lynde and Alice Grostley in "New Faces" in 1952. His movie credits include "Hell is for Heroes" with Steve McQueen. He worked with Bobby Darin, James Colburn and Bob Newhart during his career.

Freddie Bryant----Wrote the words and music to the club's theme song "Have Another" and he also wrote many of the shows. Freddie went on to Broadway where he sang, danced, acted on stage, radio and nightclubs for ten years. He migrated to Hollywood in 1932 and eventually came back to Baltimore where he became president of the club in 1956.

Magruder E. Passano---One of the owners of Waverly Press which for many years until they sold out to a Germen company was the largest publisher of medical books and journals in the World.

Stanislav Rembski---- Local Artist born in 1897 and died in 1998. He was a member of the club when he died at 101 years old. He painted the official portraits of Governor Tawes and Mrs. Tawes, which hangs in the State house in Annapolis. He also painted the portraits of four first ladies of the State of Maryland, Mrs. Lane, Mrs. McKelden, Mrs. Nice, and Mrs. O'Connor. He did a painting of Franklin Roosevelt, posthumously. The painting hangs in the Directors Office of

the Roosevelt Presidential Library at Hyde Park. Stanislav was married to Dr. Lou Pratt's cousins. Dr Pratt was a member of the club for many years and is the father in law of a current member, Frank Fiske.

Garry Moore---Famous TV personality of the 50's and 60's. He was a member back in the 40's and 50's.

Robert S. Maslin II----Owner of WFBR radio Station was a member of the club for 68 years. He formed the Uptown String Band that was famous all over Baltimore.

H. Riall Jackson---- President of the club in 1953-1954, he was the son of Howard Jackson, Mayor of Baltimore, and brother in law of Rosa Ponselle the famous Metropolitan Opera Diva from Baltimore.

Richard Q. Yardley---- Editorial cartoonist for the Baltimore Sun Papers who did the show covers for many years

John Slade/Kandi Slade----Owners of the Jenkins Funeral Home, the oldest funeral home in continuous operation in the US. The Jenkins Funeral Home buried former US President John Quincy Adams in 1848 and Charles Jerome Bonaparte in 1921.

Samuel Cook----Nationally knows expert in labor law who headed the labor department at Venable, Baetjer and Howard and chief labor negotiator for the Associated Builders and Contractors. Sam was an active member of the Paint and Powder Club for many years and was an accomplished harmonica player who appeared in the Club's annual show.

Miscellaneous:

The club has held its show at just about every possible theater, auditorium and venue in Baltimore. A partial list of sites used by the Club included Ford's Theater, Lyceum, Alcazar, Poly, Lyric, F. Scott Black's Dinner Theater, The Auditorium, Masonic Temple, Boumi Temple, Towson State, The Civic Center, Eastern High School, Maryland Casualty Auditorium, Lehmann's Hall, the Maryland and most recently the Timonium Dinner Theater.

There have been a number of periods where the club ceased to formally function or put on shows, notably 1897-1905, 1917-1921, 1926-1934, and 1943-1946. There has been a show produced every year since 1947 except 1984 when the Production Company from New York that was directing the show walked out.

Several of our members can trace their roots directly back to the founding fathers of the country.

Dandridge Brooke is a direct descendant of Martha (Dandridge) Washington. Judy Brewster's husband, Senator Dan Brewster, was the great, great, great, great grandson and a direct descendant of Benjamin Franklin. Sandra M. Stellmann is a direct descendant of President James Monroe.

Bernie Cook the writer, director and producer of the Paint & Powder Shows for seventeen years toured with the Fred Waring band and sang with the Tommy and Jimmy Dorsey bands, the Glen Miller band and many of the famous big bands of the past. Bernie also directed the Men's Chorus for many years prior to taking on the production of the Annual Show.

Jane Sewell was a member of the June Taylor Dancers and is a member of the famous Shriver Family of Carroll County. She directs the Shriver Homestead Foundation. Her well know cousin Sargent Shriver married Eunice Kennedy, sister to President Kennedy.

Mickey Webster was three time all American for the Hopkins Lacrosse Team in the 1950s. He led Hopkins to a National Championship in 1956 and an unbeaten season in 1957. He was inducted into the Lacrosse Hall of Fame in 1978.

A wood cut of the now familiar logo of the Paint and Powder Club, consisting of the theatrical masks of Tragedy and Comedy and prepared by a local artist, was presented to The Club in December of 1955 with the suggestion that it be used on all future publications and mailings.

The Club, in 2014, established the Paint and Powder Club Performing Arts Award for Vocal, Dance and Chorography. Two scholarships are

to be awarded each year on the last night of the show to the best new member of the show's cast. The purpose of the award is to encourage young people to be in the shows, bring in a new audience in the form of friends and relatives of the candidates and ultimately encourage new people to become members of the club. The first \$1,000 award was to Dale Vaughn for dance at the May 23, 2015 show. The award has been renamed in honor of Chris Barry Hergenroeder and is now known as "The Paint & Powder Club, Chris Barry Hergenroeder, Performing Arts Scholarship Award for Dance and Voice". Chris created the award and persevered for many years to have it formally recognized by the Club.

The Musical Accompanist for the 2016 show "Best of the Bits" rehearsals and shows was provided by Richard Schroeder who plaid the piano for the rehearsals and the show. Richard went to school with Charles Schulz who is the cartoonist who created the "Peanuts" cartoon. There is a character in the cartoon named Schroder who is always playing the piano. Richard Schroder was the inspiration for the cartoon character "Schroder".

The Club has no paid employees.

Family membership:

The Paint and Powder Club has always had a membership that included husbands, wives, brothers, sisters, father, sons, daughters, grandfather and great-grandfathers.

Recent Charitable contributions made by the Paint & Powder Club:






