AMENDMENTS TO BY-LAWS DELETING THE SECTION PROVIDING FOR THE OFFICE OF ANMINISTRATIVE SECRETARY AND ADDING A RULE AND POLICY COVERING THE FUNCTIONS OF "OTHER OFFICERS" REFERRED TO IN THE BY-LAWS

The Board of Governors, at its July, 2017 meeting, voted to amend the By-Laws by (a) deleting ARTICLE III: OFFICERS, Section 8. *Administrative Secretary*, and (b) adding Rule and Policy No. 3. *Functions, Duties and Limitations of Other Officers*.

These By-Law amendments are effective immediately; however they may be repealed or altered by the general membership at the next meeting of the members to be held on January 17 2018, at 7:30pm.

“ My fraternity brother's name is Charles W. St. Clair. He came to Chicago in June 1968 to help me load up and move back to Memphis when I finished grad school at Northwestern, in Evanston, Ill.

A former student from Crete-Monee High School found the article (right) and Chip's picture in an old scrapbook and shared it with me via Facebook.

I started the PTA Fundraiser in March 1967 and directed the shows for two years. After I left Chicago, the Show Time Revue continued for 15 years. The net for the two years I directed these

production was \$5,000 each year. Not too bad for 1967.

During my years in Chicago I was a Biology teacher, freshman football coach and the varsity golf coach. I also was the Director of Student Affairs. But, I do tend to go on and on!”

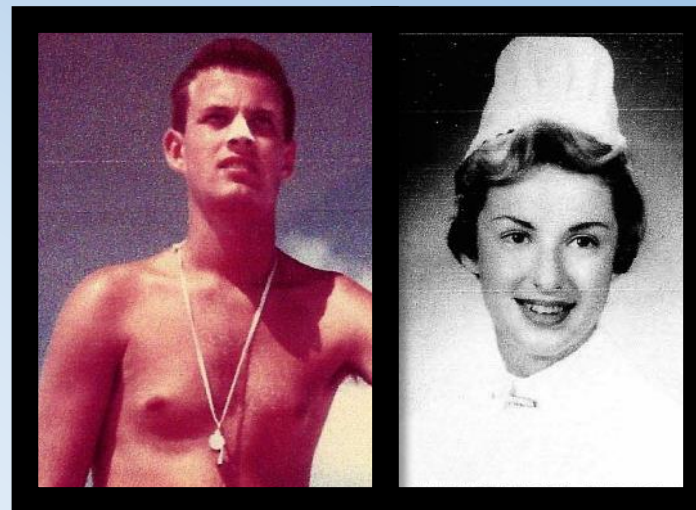
ACT IV

They can't believe that they're Senior Citizens –Still young at heart, but losing friends and acquiring aches and pains daily! They still love all of the P & P functions and friends old and new.



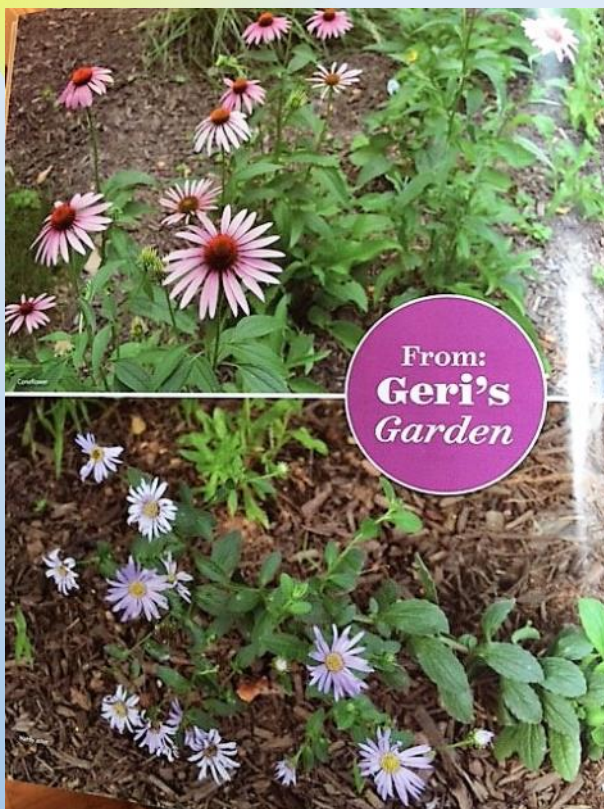

Going Native!!!

Why should you pick native plants for your garden? Well, the number one reason is the low maintenance. Native plants happily grow in our climates without the need for fertilizer and extra watering, etc. Secondly, they are a food source. They attract and then provide the appropriate food for local insects, bees, and butterflies. Last but not least, since some native plants are naturally deer resistant, they can provide a form of natural defense against the deer.

You can mix native plants with some evergreens, perennials, and annuals for continuous color.

But lastly, enjoy your garden!!

Here are just a few of the great native plants/bushes for our area:

1. *Asclepias* "windflower" - a perennial. It spreads, flowers in fall, and is gone in winter. It is generally on the "deer-resistant" list, but unfortunately deer don't read the list!!
2. *Hardy aster* - a perennial. It has shades of purple with a yellow center. Gone in winter and deemed deer resistant.
3. *Nandina* - a shrub. It retains its leaves in winter. There are gorgeous bunches of red berries for birds after the blooming season. "Babies" do pop up and can be replanted elsewhere.
4. *Milkweed* - a perennial bush. It dies back in winter. It is a host plant for monarch butterflies to lay their eggs on and for caterpillars to eat! It will seed "babies."
5. *Coneflower (echinacea)* - a perennial with great colors. It is generally deer-resistant (see comment above about deer reading list!!). It is gone in winter.

So, ask about native plants when you plan your garden. Select ones that bloom at different times so you have continuous color. Above all, don't forget to ask if the plants have been sprayed with "monocro" pesticides, which harm our native insects, bees, and butterflies!!! Avoid those!
